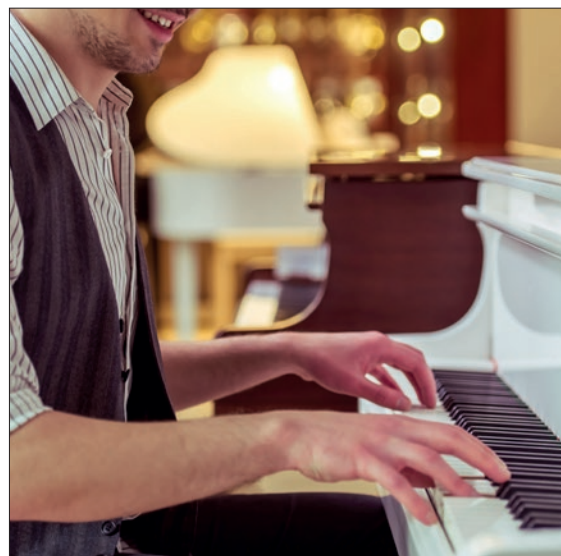

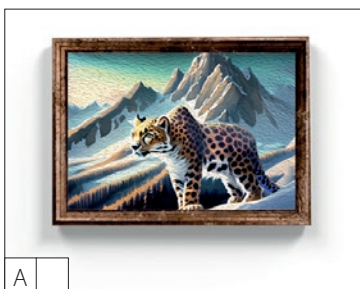

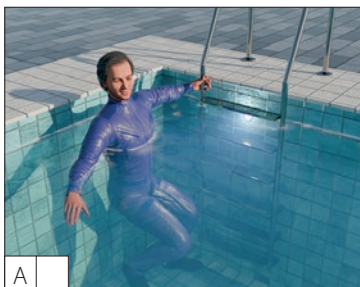

A Freya

For me, music is not just a hobby; it's a way to connect with my feelings and express myself and it's my way of life. When I'm not playing keyboards with my rock band in London, I'm listening to my favourite tracks on my headset – it's something I can't live without.

When I'm feeling stressed or anxious, I listen to reggae music as a way to feel better. It's been found that listening to music of around 60 beats per minute helps to calm us down as that's the speed of our heart when relaxed. In the morning, if I feel tired, I use lively music to give me the energy to get up. Recently, I've started song writing. I write from the heart, so when I sing and play, I feel like I'm sharing a piece of my soul with the world. Although the lyrics I create talk about my own personal experiences, I hope other people can relate to them too.

Before gigs, I love watching the audience arrive. There are usually people of all ages and backgrounds – with music, differences don't matter – it can make us feel the same.

Music, to me, is a way of exploring different places and eras and I spend most of my free time listening to music of different genres.

Lately, I've been enjoying the sounds of West African drumming and learning about how it influenced Afro-Caribbean music and jazz. At one point I was in love with Latin American dance music, such as cumbia and salsa – I thought it was the only music worth listening to, but now I've also learned to appreciate relaxing to classical music in my room.

When I go out, I take music with me. In the gym, I need the energy of rock and pop; when I study in the library, I want the peace of gentle piano music to help me focus. I have a playlist for almost every moment, with the exception of work when I leave my music in my pocket.

Beyond that, music is a social experience for me. I've made friends at concerts and music festivals. Next month, I'm meeting up with some of them at a music gig. It's incredible how music can unite people, and I love being a part of that connection.

Film photography

Why is it so popular again?

In a world dominated by digital technology, film photography is experiencing a remarkable return. You may wonder what is driving people to take photos with films in an age of smartphones and digital cameras. The reasons behind the current popularity of film photography are as diverse as the photographers themselves.

Rather like the rise in popularity of music records, one motivation for the return of film photography is the desire for something of a different quality. Many photographers, both experienced and new, are drawn to the warm look and feel of traditional photos.¹ The final picture often transports us to times gone by.

Film photography can be a slower process. Photographers must carefully select their shots and take a limited number of photos (a standard film roll has a maximum of 36 images).² In sharp contrast, digital cameras can encourage you to point and shoot, letting the camera do the work for you, and they have the ability to store hundreds of images.

For many, the journey of learning film photography is an exciting adventure. With no immediate feedback, photographers must develop patience, awareness, and learn how to use their equipment properly.³ Or you could choose to go on a face-to-face or online course. Whatever route you choose, the learning process is rewarding and connects individuals with the real meaning of photography.

Many photographers report that in this digital era, film photography offers a break from screens and the rapid pace of modern life.⁴ The photos have to be developed in the dark which further separates the photographer from the digital world, creating a peaceful escape. If this is a step too far, you could choose to get a professional to do this work.

Check in your local area for assistance: the film photography trend has given rise to many lively and helpful communities.⁵ Film photography often results in unique and happy accidents that couldn't be predicted and sharing these shots on social media leads to innovation across the community.

While photos are most commonly taken on smartphones, film photography's rising popularity demonstrates that it's become fashionable to take things slowly.⁶ Whatever the immediate future holds, the appeal of this analogue art form, where the process of taking the shot is as much a part of the art as the final image, is something worth holding on to.

Scientists and astronomers are fascinated by mysterious space rocks, known as asteroids. But it's important to consider if we should spend resources on studying these objects. The answer lies in the knowledge they offer and how they may affect our future.

In my opinion, to look after the planet and its people, we should observe asteroids closely, as they have the potential to cause damage here on Earth. Every day, about 100 tons of dust and material falls on Earth from space. While dangerous impacts are rare, understanding and tracking near-Earth asteroids is essential for taking care of our planet; it could save lives and property. From a scientific point of view, studying asteroids contributes to our knowledge of space weather and the dynamic forces of the solar system, as well as helping us to discover what certain planets are made of.

Asteroids can contain a wealth of resources, including water, precious metals and minerals. These resources could prove critical for future space missions, potentially supporting trips to the moon, Mars, and beyond. Investigating and extracting asteroids might even become a growing industry as civilization expands its presence in space. Space missions such as NASA's OSIRIS-REx and Japan's Hayabusa2 collected samples from asteroids and improved our understanding of space rocks and their potential impact on Earth. NASA's Dawn mission explored the two largest objects in the asteroid belt, Vesta and Ceres, providing valuable data about their composition and history.

In my view, it is highly probable that humans will live in space in the future, and asteroids may well be a stepping stone. Their resource potential, including materials for life support systems, fuel and construction, could enable humans to live in space. It's a vision I find both inspiring and exciting. Whether solving the mysteries of the history of our solar system or defending against possible threats, asteroids remain deeply significant in the field of space science and exploration.
